Scheme of Examination and Courses of studies for M.A. Philosophy Examination.

Scheme of Examination

- 1. That Under the regulations of the university in vogne the courses leading to the award of M.A. Degree in Philosophy shall be of two years durations. In each academic year there shall be two university examinations normally at the internal of six months known as semester I and semester II in the first academic year and semester III and semester IV in the second academic year of the course. The candidate will be examined in four papers in each semester examination.
- 2. That the candidate will bee required to attend at least 75% of lectures delivered to them.
- 3. That the total months in four semester examination taken together will be of 1600 in sixteen papers.
- 4. That in each paper continues internal assessment will be of 30 marks and the rest 70 marks will be for theoretical questions in written examination.
